Four Teams Go to New Orleans GNT Final Morse Nips Hamman by One in Playoff

47 teams competed in over the Memorial Day weekend, in Richardson, to determine which four teams would represent District 16 at the national finals in New Orleans in July. The winners are:

Superflight: Dan Morse, Greg Hinze, Nagy Kamel, Ira Hessel Flight A: Hua Yang, Hanchang Wang, Tiger King, James Zhan Flight B: David Pearlman, Joseph Gill, William Garrard Jr, Hui Hua Garrard

Flight C: George Fillis, Karen Fillis, Richard Curtin, Tessa Bodnar

There were 4 Superflight teams, 10 in A, 20 in B and 13 in C. The total of 47 teams was about average for this event. The Superflight and A had the same number of teams as last year. C was 4 more, but B was 6 less. The superflight went right into the KO round with 52 board matches. The other three flights had round robins to determine the teams to advance to the KO round.

The Superflight final was a repeat of last year. The runner-ups included Bob Hamman, Hemant Lall and Bart Bramley, who were members of the team that took third in the 2008 national final, and Chris Hamman and Ira Chorush. All but Chorush were on last year's finalist. Last year they lost to the same Morse team by 8 after 48 boards. This year, the margin was way closer. Morse came back from a 37 IMP halftime deficit to tie after 52 boards. The teams had started their second half an hour early, and that proved very thoughtful, as an 8 board playoff was needed. Hamman won 4 Imps on overtricks over the first 6 hands. There remained a low partscore and a close game that took

careful play. The game was a push so the whole match would be decided on the following hand:

Both auctions started 1C by W, 1H by N and a negative double. In one room S bid 1S and everyone passed. S made 2 for 110. At the other table. S passed and W bid and made 1NT. 90 and 110 were 200 - 5 IMPs to the Morse team and a precious 1 IMP victory. 13 years ago Hessel lost the final by one to current district president Charlie Price. This year's winners made it to the round of 8 at the Washington national last year. They led the New York team by 34 after 48 boards, but lost by one after 64!

Both teams played hard for overtrick Imps and the real opportunities to gain during the match were the big swings. Holding x xx Axx Q10xxxxx, you have an opportunity to balance after your this sequence-1S on your right: pass, 2S. pass .pass. The 3C call gets you 3S pass 4S. The cards were well placed and that was 11 IMPs to Hamman. Morse picked up when they held: AJ 852 5 KQJ62 A4 and partner opened 1C. They found out that partner had 4Ss, a stiff D, one ace and no Q of S. They bid the slam and the SQ was singleton. This slam is a slight favorite, and being down 20, with 13 hands to go. a good shot. Another big swing came on a 3NT or 4H decision. Opener held Q53 A42 K953 AQ4. Each side opened 1NT and partner transferred to 2H. The Hamman responder bid 2NT and raised opener's 3H to 4. The Morse team rebid 3NT with K104 QJ742 Q84 J5, and there they played. 4H went bait one, while 3NT made with an overtrick

A huge swing came on the following hand. After 1C 4H 5H you bid 6H, nonvul vs. vul, with xx 109753 K5 KJ104. It goes 7D on tour right and you are up again. What is your call? If you save, or pass, you end up in 7H doubled. You needed to double to stop partner from saving. In the other room it was a tad different. Left hand opponent (LHO) passed and your partner bid 1H! It proceeded 2D by RHO, 4H by you, 5D by LHO, 5H by pard and 5S on the right. In this room preemptor doubled with defense, but of course, partner pulled with long H's (7 to the AKQ) and no other card. RHO was 5 -0-7-1 and only the diamond K

Another slam swing was gained for Morse when their guy held Q5 KO1065 J54 AK7. He opened a NT. Partner transferred to 2S and rebid 3C. After 3D by openers, implying a C fit, responder bid 5NT-pick a slam. Oy. Opener tried 6C and it made on a 4-3 fit, but 5H is a tad better opposite A7 doubleton and off the D ace. The Hamman team stayed out of slam. 6S always goes down and Greg guarantees me that he would double 6NT for a S lead behind the A, holding the DA as well. Almost all of the swings were in bidding. I had thought we gained or

lost on a number of hands where one side got to a close contract and made it on accurate play, but they were almost all pushes.

In 1986 I made my first GNT final against Bob Hamman, Jim Jacoby Bobby Wolff and Seymon Deutsch. My teammate, Barry Hagedorn, the sage of Houston, gave us some great strategy. His advice was "let's jump out to an early lead, and then really pour it on!". Well we led by 26 at the quarter and then the plan went a tad awry. We scored one more IMP! Still, it was a great learning experience for me . As Butch Cassidy lamented, "Who were those guys?"

In three of the flights, at least one member of the losing finalist will go to New Orleans and play in the national finals. The Morse team added Hemant Lall, who will play with his son. Justin. The Flight C Fillis team added Brett Elliot and Richard Polunsky. Brett won the district last year and finished second in the national final in Washington. For the flight A runner-ups-the whole team gets to go! The Flight A winners had one pair that could not make it, so the second place team, Jeffrey McKee, Greg Resz, James La Fountain and Pam LaShelle, will represent district 16. They added the available pair from the original winners, Tiger King and James Zhan.

While the number of teams was about the same as in recent years, I sensed a huge amount of enthusiasm. It was very refreshing to see how excited the players were on winning. Many were glad to just get to the KO rounds. This is really a special event . and it is nice to see it prosper. I will be routing hard for all of the teams in New Orleans
