A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT Betty Starzec



With the Spring NABC in Reno in the books, the trend to return to the tables is continuing to climb. Whether you enjoy playing online or not, we can hopefully agree, that playing in person brings back not only the companionship of friends

and competitors, but also lets us again experience the "table feel" of the game, something I am very happy to return to.

As you know, the entire ACBL has experienced a significant decline in membership. The same is true in our district—as of March 31st the membership in D16 is 7,392, versus one year ago when it was 7,706. At the start of the pandemic in April, 2020, we had greater than 8,500 members.

The ACBL provides various reports to help districts and units assess their effectiveness in gaining and maintaining its membership base. Each month every unit receives an In-and-Out Report. This report tells the units who their new members are, whether they have moved into the unit or are new to the ACBL. At the same time it tells the units who moved out, haven't paid their membership fees or have died. Our D16 ranks 6th in gaining new members but ranks 5th in member losses. This report is a basis of information to assist in maintaining our membership base. Most of our units already recognize new members coming into the unit with a "welcome letter". We want these members to feel that they are part of our bridge family and a welcome starts the process. This letter can be accompanied by a free play(s) at a local club, guaranteed partner, etc. At the same time, the units can address members who have not yet paid their membership fees with a gentle reminder or phone call—maybe they forgot, the need a new partner, etc.

The point is that there is a process where units can be effective agents to assist their own membership numbers. As unit members, you can offer assistance to your unit board to join a committee to make these contacts. We all can be effective representatives of our great game. If your unit is doing something special and going the "extra mile" with these activities, please share this information with our District Membership Chair, Sandy Potts at

Sandy.Potts5@yahoo.com, who will spread the word!

By the way, everyone is always interested in the age of the membership—over the entire ACBL it is 73.96 and D16 is 74.26 years. We rank 17th.

DISTRICT DIRECTOR'S REPORT, REGION 9

The Reno NABC had 6204 total tables up nearly 1000 tables from Austin. Overall declines in Covid cases should help future NABC attendance and I'm looking forward to Providence.

Reno marked the debut of **Entry Express** where players can get their entries electronically. It had been tested previously at a couple of regional tournaments. According to the post-tournament survey, players who used it were quite satisfied.

Membership continued to decline at a 6% per year rate during the 1st quarter of 2022. As more clubs reopen for face-to-face play, we expect teaching programs and new member recruitment to pick up through the remainder of 2022. Management is planning a campaign to encourage lapsed members to rejoin.

The Board continues to work on cleaning up the codification and delegating to bridge-related volunteer committees as we continue to downsize over the next few years.

Online cheating continues to be a problem and you may have seen the announcement of **EDGAR**, named in honor of Edgar Kaplan; the father of modern bridge ethics. This system will be a step change in both our ability to detect cheating and the transparency of the data for those accused of ethical violations, as well as those involved in hearing the cases. There is a good article on Bridge Winners by A.J. Stephani, chairman of the Board's Appeals and Charges Committee. We all owe Franco Baseggio and Brian Platnick a huge round of applause and thanks for their volunteer work on this system. I'm confident that the implementation of EDGAR will enable ACBL to clear the backlog of cases and enable very timely decisions in the future.



I was also encouraged

by the report on Information Technology made by Susie Cordell during our Reno meeting. By developing partnerships with outside vendors, work on several projects is accelerating and just as Entry Express was successfully implements, I'm looking forward to more improvements in other technology areas this year.

The Board has begun work on the longer-term issues with Virtual Clubs. We hope to have a good discussion in Providence and put regulations in place following that meeting.

Our tournament calendar is starting to return to pre-pandemic levels and I'd like to encourage you to attend and support our districts tournaments. I think you'll find them safe and enjoyable and enjoy the comradery.

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ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORT, MARCH 2022 Tomi Storey



The AC was in full meeting mode in late February and March. Our first meeting was on February 27th. This was a pre-NABC meeting to give members a chance to discuss the Board of Directors agenda items. The second meeting

was on March 13th and proved very frustrating for a large portion of the representatives. The meeting was held at the Reno NABC and on the Zoom platform for the members unable to attend. Unfortunately, there were technical issues for those attending via Zoom and a large number attending remotely were unable to take part. The hotel apologized, but this created a meeting without a quorum, so no formal voting could take place. A third meeting took place March 30th on Zoom, so that the full membership could hear all discussion items. Isn't technology grand? It always seems to fail at the most inopportune times, but we can't live without it.

The items discussed included privacy and marketing to ACBL members, robots appearing in virtual club games, IT issues (this brought a laugh from all) and NABC websites from the local districts that conflict with the NABC site.

ACBL Executive Director Joe Jones told us that financially, the ACBL is doing well. Year 2021 ended with a net operating income of \$2.6M. The ACBL balance sheet has increased to 5x since 2019, from \$2 million to \$10 million. The Reno NABC was a success by table count. There were 6200 tables, up from 5000 in Austin. At the end of the tournament, several players tested positive for Covid. Post-tournament surveys were sent out and the ACBL will use these results to aid in safety policies. At this point, the ACBL will continue to follow CDC guidelines. Tournament attendance levels are about 50%. We continue to have many IT projects in progress, but things are moving slowly.

There were a number of topics discussed in the Q&A section of the meeting, but the one that took center stage was online vs local clubs. It was asked why the ACBL continues to host online regionals when F2F bridge is struggling. Is there a possibility that the ACBL could allow units and districts to host online events? At this time, it is a management and board decision to centralize online tournaments with the ACBL only, but there is a possibility that could change in the future.

Several important points were discussed about the club vs online issue. F2F clubs are struggling and there is not a level playing field with online bridge. Only half of all clubs are operating now versus 2019. Tables counts have dropped from 2,000,000 to 500,000. Suggestions were made to equalize things, from setting up a new color point for online events, dropping robot events that pay pigments points, and increasing black points needed to make life master, bringing the proliferation of black points online in proportion.

Your Advisory Council representatives from D16 would be very interested in hearing any suggestions you might have on these issues, or any other bridge ideas you might have to improve our game. Please contact me, Betty Starzec, or Nancy Strohmer. The Advisory Council serves as a conduit between the membership and the Board of Directors, and we would love to hear from you.

I hope to see you at the table soon!

EFFECTIVE MARCH 1, 2022

This is the guidelines document that was published by the ACBL. The ACBL has not released anything more current than this.

Based upon the most recently received guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the following will be in effect: Until further notice, the following are mandatory:

- 1. VACCINATION: All staff, players and volunteers must be fully vaccinated with a complete set of vaccinations completed no less than 14 days before the date of the event in which the player wishes to purchase an entry (booster shots are highly recommended, but not required at this time). Unless prohibited by law, each player must provide proof of vaccination to the Event Safety Coordinator or a member of their staff. In areas or locations where requiring proof of vaccination is prohibited by law, the event sponsor must put in place other precautions, such as mandatory rapid COVID testing and mask requirements. Please check with the Tournament Chair for any changes or updates to this policy.
- 2. MASK REQUIREMENTS: Any tournament staffed by the ACBL must require masking of players, staff and volunteers when the COVID-19 Community Level rate is indicated as "High" (as determined by the CDC or a similar metric from a health agency). This will be reviewed on a daily basis, therefore, players should be prepared for this to change during a tournament. Whether or not masks are required, masking is always recommended, particularly if an attendee is at high risk for severe illness or otherwise is a member of a vulnerable population. This ACBL policy does not countermand any ordinance or law in effect at the site of the tournament.
- 3. HAND SANITIZER: Hand sanitizer must be readily available inside the playing area.
- **4. EVENT SAFETY COORDINATOR:** Each tournament sponsor must provide a designated Event Safety Coordinator, who will be available to review proof of vaccinations, etc.
- 5. TABLE SPACING: Tables must be set at a minimum of 9 feet centers.

Please note that all the above are subject to change. Please check with the Tournament Chair for any clarification or further information.

CHARITY, CHARITY, CHARITY! Nancy Strohmer



All of April was Charity Month in the face-toface clubs. Clubs were allowed to hold an unlimited number of Charity Games—we hope you played in as many as possible earning extra masterpoints! Clubs could choose to designate each

game's proceeds as going to the ACBL Charity Foundation or a local charity, with at least half given to the Foundation, an organization dedicated to supporting local communities in all 25 districts.

D16 held charity games on March 22, 23, 24 and 25 for grassroots and charity, but because of the need in Ukraine, clubs could designate the \$4/table to go to D16 grassroots and charity or the Ukraine effort. These unusual circumstances prompted ACBL to allow D16 to hold District charity games again on July 12, 13, 14 and 15.

An entire week was designated as Charity Week for virtual clubs. A portion of the table fees during Charity Week went directly to the ACBL Charity Foundation. Of these proceeds, the Foundation pledged 50 percent of its proceeds up to \$25,000 to UNICEF's Children in Ukraine Fund. ACBL also contributed money from both face-to-face and online games to the United Nations World Food Program, with funds earmarked for Ukraine.

NAP CONDITIONS OF CONTEST

The North American Pairs (NAP) is an ACBLwide event held annually. Players must qualify to advance to the next level of competition. The event starts each summer with club-level qualification. Players may qualify at any club NAP game in

the ACBL with any partner. (The club does not have to be in your district or unit.) One may play in any number of club-level NAP games, even after qualifying. There are three flights—A, B, and C.

Flight A is 2500+ masterpoints. Flight B is 500-2500 masterpoints, and Flight C is less than 500 masterpoints *AND not having life master status*.

You don't have to play with someone in your flight, although the flight status of the pair is determined by the player with the higher number of masterpoints. If you earn a Flight A (B) qualification, you automatically earn a Flight B or C (C) qualification, provided that you are eligible for the lower-level flight.

Some districts require unit-level qualification. District 16 does not. The district-level qualification event (in District 16) is currently held in January in Austin (odd-numbered years) and San Antonio (even-numbered years) in conjunction with an open sectional tournament. It is a two-day event (*usually*, see exceptions below) with two sessions per day. After the first day, about half of the field is eliminated. At the district-level, both players of a pair must play in a flight for which they qualified. The pair may choose to play in a higher-level flight if both players earned a qualification for that higherlevel flight. (For example, two flight C players who have earned a Flight B and a Flight C qualification may elect to play in Flight B even though they could play in Flight C.).

You may enter only one flight. You do not have to play with a partner with whom you qualified at a lower-level competition. Both players must be residents of the district in which they resided on June 1st of the preceding year.

Pairs qualifying at the district-level advance to the national-level. There are three (occasionally four) qualifiers at the district-level. The national-level event is held at the spring (March) nationals. There are stipends paid by the ACBL to help defray player expenses. If some of the district-level qualifying pairs are not able to attend the nationals, the ACBL contacts other district-level pairs in order of place and offers such pairs the opportunity to represent their district at the nationals. (No stipend is paid (by the ACBL) to such pairs. Districts and units might still pay stipends to such pairs.)

Some districts provide additional stipends (District 16 currently does). Some units provide additional stipends. (Check with your unit board.) District(16)-level stipends are paid after the national event is held and might be withheld if the pair had Zero Tolerance violations at the district and/or national levels.

EXCEPTION: If 16 or fewer pairs enter the District 16 NAP finals *for a given flight*, such flight will have a one-day, two-session play-through final to determine the national-level qualifiers for *that* flight.




The first time I arrived in Reno was the summer of 1961 while returning home from a 2-year tour of duty in the United States Army Alaska. It was a little northern Nevada oasis with limited neons, popular gambling, and strong entertainment.

I remember seeing Keely Smith and Louis Prima performing live in a dingy 10-stool bar.

Fast forward to 7-8 years later. We West Coasters heard there was a new Christmas week Regional bridge tournament there and you would get a free roll of nickels to play slots with. Great fun, and great prices—full breakfast cost much less than a cup of java at today's Starbucks.

That tournament boomed in popularity and attendance to become one of the best attended in

the country. It was so successful that December holiday copycats soon sprung up all over the ACBL.

My next Reno visit was the 2016 Spring NABC during my term as ACBL president. What I remember most was the necessary daily walk from my host hotel room through a huge smoke-filled casino to get to the playing area. (Too bad that was before mask mandates.) The city was now alive and bustling with serious gamblers, bridge players, and California getaways. ACBL national attendance was good at 11,642 tables as the Reno allure of the 60s was reborn.

Now to the 2022 Spring NABC. Reno reminded me of a deserted city from a cheap sci-fi or western

movie—void of the crowds of six years earlier. The casinos were so uninhabited that the once smoke-cloud casino walk was more like a cake walk. I only saw a couple of slot machine puffers the entire week.

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

PLAY OF THE HAND CHALLENGE

Thomas Rush



I had the pleasure of playing at the recent Spring Nationals in Reno, NV and had a couple fun declarer problems, which I'll feature in this and my next article.

Your careful play of the hand will be the difference


between getting close to a top and getting a (near) bottom.

Are you up to the challenge?

NOTES:

- 1. These hands should be a bit of a challenge for the intermediate player, but easy for the advanced player.
- One of the best ways to improve your declarer play is to work through the Bridge Master hands on BBO under "*Practice*" — you'll learn many useful techniques to expand your declarer's toolbox. The difficulty ranges from early skills through world-class challenge.s
- 3. There are no 'tricks'; the hands do not rely on some 2% lay of the cards. Count your tricks, figure out the best line, plan your play, and the right play will work with normal distributions.
- 4. Your plan should include when to draw trump and what to do before, during (if you need to interrupt drawing trump), and after drawing trump.
- 5. Both hands occurred in matchpoint events.
- 6. The answer to the first problem will be provided at the end of this newsletter – work it out before looking! I'll also give the second problem as a challenge; look for the answer next issue!

HAND 1



The ace of spades is led. Hearts are 3-1. Plan the play to make your contract against one of Texas' best known teachers.

Step One: Count your tricks; make sure you get to 12 before you write down your iron-clad plan. If you play correctly, the defense cannot stop you.

SOLUTION TO HAND 1

This hand seems to have only 10 tricks. Four hearts after we knock out the heart A, a diamond, a spade since they were nice enough to set up our king, and four clubs -- 4+1+1+4. Where can we get two more tricks? If hearts were 2-2, it would be easy; draw two rounds of trump, play four rounds of clubs pitching dummy's two diamond losers, and then ruff two diamonds with dummy's two remaining trump.But hearts will only be 2-2 about 40% of the time.

Can't you come up with a better line?

Note: When hearts are 3-1, we cannot afford to draw all trump, because that only gives us 11 tricks, even with ruffing a diamond in dummy (assumes



draw trump, play four rounds of clubs pitching two diamonds, then ruff one diamond in dummy, but that's dummy's last trump, we'll have a diamond loser still). You also can't afford to play four rounds of clubs before you draw trump, as somebody's going to ruff that 4th club.

We are not going to rely on opponents' bad plays. For instance, it won't work to lead the diamond Queen for a '*fake finesse*'; either the Queen is covered by the King and you win your Ace, leaving you with the diamond Jack to lose, or, the Queen rides around to the King when LHO doesn't cover.

A diamond and a trump loser is one too many in this slam; find a legitimate way to make the hand!

The answer is that you can find a better line—it's a simple dummy reversal. We're going to ruff three losing spades in our hand, and use dummy's hearts to draw trump.

Some things to think about: This would be a bit risky if LHO had not shown a six-card spade suit; LHO might be short in spades and over-ruff us if we're not careful. Here, LHO has shown length in spades, so we are confident he's not going to overruff even the 4th round of spades. We might have to overruff RHO, though, but our spots are good enough.

So let's ruff the spade ace low and play one round of trump, say the king from our hand. If RHO wins and continues a heart, we still have two trump in hand for spade ruffs, and enough entries to get to dummy (the second heart in dummy, the diamond ace, and the club Queen) to ruff two more spades and then draw trump (pitching your two losing diamonds). After trump are goine, cash the spade K (pitch another diamond), play a club to the AKJ to pitch _dummy's_ low diamonds. Dummy's last trump is your 12th trick, as you play the last diamond from your hand.

If RHO leads something else after winning the heart ace, you can win in dummy and ruff two more spades in hand. Then get to dummy, draw trump, and proceed as above. This is a classic Dummy Reversal—you ruff enough times in the long trump hand until the other hand becomes longer in trump, and then use what had been the short trump hand to draw the final trump.

On this hand, it lets you count up tricks like this (not in play order!):

Three ruffs in hand (South), three trump in dummy (used to draw trump), four clubs, Diamond A, and Spade K - 3 + 3 + 4 + 1 + 1 = 12.

Dummy reversals are a great tool; look for them when dummy's trump are good enough to be able to draw the opponents' trumps (a dummy reversal wouldn't have worked here if you held KQJTx of hearts, and dummy held, say, 8743, because ruffing with the x, T, J of hearts would promote the opponents' A98x (where one held A8x or A9x) to a second trump winner).

If you were paying attention above, you might have seen the magic of a dummy reversal. We got to ruff spades with our trump in hand, then pitch diamonds from our hand on dummy's trump, then pitch diamonds from dummy on our hand's clubs, and lastly ruff a diamond with dummy's last trump. Here, a dummy reversal was a way to get six trump tricks from our five-card suit, instead of just four trump tricks with standard play.



HAND 2:



Once again, nothing particularly tricky, and no particularly wild distribution to contend with. You need to find a distribution that allows you to take 11 tricks in diamonds after the ace of clubs is led, and South shifts to a diamond.

HINTS:

Diamonds are 2-1

You'll need to specify the timing. Do things in the wrong order, or at the wrong time, and you cut your chances way back (or give yourself no chance). So write down your plan and check that it works.


You'll need to specify the spots you play for full credit – it's not enough to call 'low' or 'high' of this suit or that one.

This one needs a bit of luck – but it's the only reasonable line I could think of at the table, and it's a reasonable shot.

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THE MOST BEAUTIFUL GAME IN THE WORLD

As we all know, Bridge is the most beautiful game in the world, or better said, sport. Unlike many games and sports where we win or lose on our own, bridge is a partnership game.

In life, a partnership is a relationship between two individuals who agree to have open communication, flexibility, mutual benefit, and understanding. A partnership in bridge is no different.

Nevertheless, not everyone is a good partner in bridge and in most cases, it has nothing to do with skill but rather with being a *good partner*.

WHAT ARE SOME ATTRIBUTES THAT MAKE A GOOD PARTNER?

- *FIRST OF ALL, YOU HAVE TO BE NICE:* This means both at and away from the table, especially to your partner
- UNDERSTANDING YOUR PARTNER'S NEEDS IS A HUGE ASSET:
 - Does your partner gets distracted by small talk? Avoid it.
 - Is he/she not a morning person? Buy the entry so that he/she can get extra sleep.
 - Does he/she forget to keep score? Make sure you always keep it.

Small details go a long way. The more comfortable your partner feels, the better he/she will play

• CONTROL YOUR EMOTIONS.

I am pretty sure you have way too many reasons to want to leave the table and never see your partner again while you rip off every single card he or she just played. The truth is, your options are limited, because you're committed to finishing the game with that partner, and you aren't going to get the most mileage out of them by yelling. Save the discussion for the postmortem because discussing it mid-game will only serve to distract both of you from the hands to come, and...*always keep in mind that you've probably made some bone-headed mistakes in the past yourself*.

• WHAT YOU DO OUTSIDE OF THE TABLE CAN AFFECT YOUR PARTNERSHIP.

Do you tend to discuss hands with others where your partner made a mistake? Shaming someone won't make either of you better players. Why not focus on your own mistakes? You will learn more and won't affect your partner's bridge confidence.

• THERE IS NO SUCH THING AS WINNING "WITH YOUR SUIT" OR DEFEATING A CONTRACT BY YOURSELF.

Bridge is a partnership game so it is ALWAYS the partnership who wins or loses.

• "STRENGTHENING YOUR STRENGTHS"

This is a very effective method for becoming better at anything. Have you tried complimenting your partner on the things he/she does well? It might be a great motivator and reassurance of the good strategies that will make you win.

The list can go on forever, but I imagine you're starting to get the idea. If once in a blue moon, you fail to follow this list, please don't worry. The important thing is to get back on track. Apologize to your partner first, then get back to doing all the things you know that will make you a good partner.

Remember that we are <u>all</u> learning together.

GIVE ME THE F2F WORLD Stu Nelan



How many times have you thought this, or heard someone else express this:

Before Covid, I played bridge most every day of the week, I had multiple partners at multiple Clubs and enjoyed the social experience and

the learning that went on. Then Covid came and shut everything down. I hadn't played online bridge before, but tried it and it was good! Shorter 18-board games, some mistakes are eliminated mis-sort your cards, bid out of turn, insufficient bid, lead or play out of turn, renege. Why should I go back to face-to-face bridge?

Or this:

I'm a newer player and didn't play at all before Covid. But when social distancing came I started playing online and found it to be a nice experience! Games are available almostany time around the clock. And games are quick and casual—I can play in my PJ's. Partners are available around the country or further. Bids are explained by the bidder. Immediate analysis tools—What is a bidding box? What is a BridgeMate? Why should I play face-toface bridge?

The bridge world took a 180-degree turn when Covid hit, from all face-to-face (F2F) games to all online games. And now that Covid is coming under control, many of us are considering a return to F2F bridge.

But why? With all the advantages that online bridge has, why would we even consider going back to the "old" game?

The reason is the thrill of the F2F game! The feel of the cards, the bidding boxes. Actually seeing your partner and opponents. The feel of the players at the table, the psychology of the game, "table presence", sizing up your opponents. Online eliminates some of the potential irregularities, but it also eliminates some of the subtleties of F2F bridge that make the game what it is.

Socializing: Seeing old friends that we haven't seen for a while. Meeting new friends, new potential partners. It's easier to talk with a new potential partner F2F than it is online. Are we compatible? Do we have similar mindsetsand goals? Most of my partners online were F2F partners before Covid.

Learning: Discussing the hands with the other players after the session is over. Hearing their rationale for what they did. Discussing with your partner some of the problem hands.

Classes: Classes are perhaps more productive in a F2F bridge setting, instead of remote. Asking questions, hearing other comments and questions.

Clubs: The F2F Clubs are coming back, but it is a slow struggle. Times have changed. Where we used to have many games a week at the Clubs, now we have only a few. The Clubs really need our support.

Tournaments: Is there anything more satisfying and challenging and exciting than walking into a large room full of bridge players in the morning? All discussing past hands and conventions, meeting friends, all eager for the games to begin. And the best way to prepare for F2F Tournaments is to play F2F bridge at the Clubs.

So for me, online bridge is OK. It served its purpose when that was all we had. And it is still OK...sometimes now.

But give me the F2F world! That is where the action is!

Congratulations to Arvind Sharma on achieving the rank of Life Master. You are reminded that games are timed events. Seven minutes per board is typically allowed. Everyone should attempt to comply with this limit and be ready to move when the director calls the round.

The director has broad discretionary powers when players fall behind including assigning below average scores or requiring a late play. The following are suggestions that may aid in remaining on time.

• Except for bidding, play or scoring questions, discussions should be limited until after all the hands of a round have been played to ensure they are completed in a timely manner.

Any conversation should be conducted in low voice; talk can be distracting to others and discussion of a hand may reveal information to those who have not yet played the hand.

• The opening lead should be made face down followed by the question "May I lead?". This helps prevent leads from the wrong hand and offers a



chance for either side to ask for clarifications.

If someone makes a face up opening lead from the wrong hand then the director must be summoned – there are numerous options available to the offended side and it frequently requires some time to explain them all and make a decision.

Also note the change in wording of the question prior to leading; in the past it has often asked as "Any questions partner?". Asking the question incorrectly is not likely to delay the game nor incur penalties, but it's always nice to follow the expected procedures. • And, *very importantly*, the player on opening lead should write down the contract only *after* they have made their lead. This can save a significant amount of time in the long run.

Finally, thanks to Lynn Long who edits the Unit's local newsletter. Please note her suggestion to provide information that might be of interest to the Unit's players or warrant inclusion in D16's Scorecard.



In March, Rita Wiegenstein invited Unit 207 Board members to play at the Sun City Duplicate Bridge Club in Georgetown. What a great way to spend the afternoon! The players and game organizers were warm and welcoming, in addition to offering some good bridge competition.

The Sun City games have interested me over the past few years—as other clubs were losing members, Sun City games were growing . . . so I asked Billie Ogens and Rita Wiegenstein to put together the Sun City bridge story. The bottom line of the story is love of bridge and love of those who play bridge.

The Sun City club is governed by the Sun City Community Association, an invitation-only club according to ACBL bylaws. Unfortunately, that means masterpoints are awarded at only 80% of a public club game, so players must work extra hard to accumulate masterpoints.

The Sun City Bridge Club began in homes and meeting places during the first few years of Sun City Development, which started 25 years ago. Once the Amenities Center was built, the games were held at the Center. All players had to be Sun City residents (per the Community Association Rules of Sun City) or by invitation. These were primarily social style games. Then a group that knew about duplicate bridge added a duplicate game to the schedule. Jack Lacy directed and taught in the early days.

Seventeen years ago, Inez Grider organized and began directing a Monday morning game and teaching a mini lesson before the game. (She and her husband Don had spent the previous two years travelling around the country playing in bridge tournaments to earn their Life Master Awards.) Six years later she began directing a Thursday afternoon game. At that time, Thursday was the only ACBL-sanctioned game in Sun City, along with four other weekly non-sanctioned game.

When directing, Inez is dedicated to making the game enjoyable for all, easy going, highly competitive and fun to play. Her sense of humor goes a long way in accomplishing an atmosphere that is so fitting for a senior audience. The club began to thrive on the mix of solid competition and a good deal of social gatherings and parties at the club. Individual club members donated the money that enabled the club to buy a dealing machine and to have hand records.

When Betsy Lidgey and her husband moved to Sun City, she and another "bridge friend" started the Georgetown Bridge Club, a public game.

Betsy still manages that club, which meets every Wednesday at the Georgetown Recreational Center. Don and Inez Grider co-direct the game. Betsy has been "the most instrumental" in In 2016 the Sun City Duplicate Bridge Club Board created a committee called "Pathways to Growth" that was charged with finding ways to increase membership, which started by implementing a novice game.

This committee is chaired by Billie Ogens, who has worn so many hats for the club and unit bridge. She is currently manager of the Thursday game and is Vice President of the Board, she's served as Secretary, teaches BB2 Billie organized 12 members to go on a bridge cruise out of Galveston the week before the Covid shutdown.

Other Pathways to Growth members representing each of our five games are Betsy Lidgey, Inez Grider, Mike Martin, Cindy McCauley and Rita Wiegenstein.

And Rita has been a spark of enthusiasm and leadership since she arrived in Sun City and learned to play bridge in 2010. She chaired the Welcome

founding and managing details for both of the Georgetown clubs. She was the first volunteer certified club director and has served as Board President and Vice President multiple years. She keeps equipment running, records up to date, and rooms reserved for both games.

-Competitive bidding and cochaired the Welcome Desk for the NABC in Austin. Her friendliness, efficiency and inspiring attitude makes all feel welcome.

Year after year the club has become more creative with ways to make bridge fun as well as competitive. In March 2020, Desk at the NABC tournament in Austin. attention to new-comers, as many people move in from out of town/ state to become part of the club on a full or seasonal basis. Rita said, "We have a growing list of teachers and students each year. We first began a novice game in 2016 with twelve willing students who committed to a trial for six weeks. The game became a big success until Covid."

This year there is a new program of afternoon seminars for our advancing players, taught by our club members. In 2019 the club invited professional player/ teacher Robert Todd, who gave a very successful half day seminar for 100 members. According to Billie Ogens, Sun City is a great place to retire to and play bridge! Some of the comments that have come to us from new members moving into Sun City are, "This is the nicest friendliest club I have ever played in." (Now this person was from "out of state.") Another quote: "The people here are sooo friendly?" (I don't think this person had ever lived in the south

before). Another person who had to move away said, "I can't find another bridge club that's like the Sun City Club."

And Billie continues, "After many years we were able to convert the four non-sanction games to sanctioned. Older people don't make changes that easily! That change had its pluses and minuses for our members. Most members are not tournament players, but we are working on increasing that number. If you take a new person to a tournament and have a really good time there, versus concentrating only on masterpoints it's a win/win for everyone!"
