As I mentioned in my last post, membership growth and retention is a major focus in our District. Education is the cornerstone of encouraging players to learn and experience the game at advancing levels. The District has established Unit support for various programs offered by the ACBL, as well as participating in special online learning games and lectures.

If Education is the cornerstone, then teachers are the builders of new players. During Covid some of our District's teachers have transitioned to online teaching, but many face-to-face teachers have retired during this environment.

If a Unit feels this is the case, they can apply to the District to host an ACBL teacher course, which will be paid for by the District. (The District will pay for two courses per year.)

The ACBL offers the Best Practices Course and also an Online Teaching Certification focusing, obviously, on online teaching. The District will pay the ACBL fee and the Unit would have a minimal charge to its participants to pay for refreshments, typically $\$ 50$ per person. (The ACBL fee for these courses is $\$ 125$ per person.)

In addition, the ACBL Educational Foundation offers a "startup kit" for teachers that includes a choice of boards, bidding boxes and cards or Shark Bridge credits or VuBridge Cardplay Basics, as well as a BridgeBee module on Doubles by Robert Todd.

Participants receive a free one-year membership in the American Bridge Teachers Association.

There are a lot of incentives available if you are thinking of becoming a teacher.

Another program is Learn Bridge in a Day (LBIAD) created by ACBL Hall of Fame player, Patty Tucker. The District will also consider paying for the program to come to your area. While presented by Patty or one of her facilitators, the focus is creating possible students for local teachers. LBIAD has had great success when the local coordinators create an effective marketing program, as outlined in Patty's material.

The monthly lectures for Beginners and Intermediates have run into a few stumbling blocks-scheduling issues, tournament conflicts, and presenter conflicts. By the time you read this post, I am hopeful that we will have resolved all issues and that the courses will return on a regular basis.

As you may have noticed, with recent Robly announcements, some sectionals have experienced breakthrough Covid cases. While it is known that many cases present no symptoms, I would like to emphasize that if you have a cold or cough please stay away from the tournament or club game. Players are more conscious of possible issues with symptomatic people. Thank you for cooperating!

As you are reading this missive, I will have been at the Firecracker Regional in Austin and hope that I've seen many of you there!

Overall, there is good news on the Covid-19 front, as cases and transmission rates are down markedly from their peak, and a much higher percentage of the population is fully vaccinated. Clubs continue to reopen and more tournaments are being held. While many tournaments report people testing positive during or immediately after a tournament, none of them have resulted in a "super-spreader" event.

The Board has begun to address some longerterm issues and more will be on our agenda for Providence and Phoenix. One of the areas concerns masterpoint awards. We recognize that there has been a problem with the definition of a regular game at 18 boards which awards the same masterpoints for 18 boards as for 27 boards.

In our May special meeting, we agreed that masterpoint awards should be proportional to the number of boards played. While we do not expect to implement the change before fall, 18 board will continue to generate the same masterpoint awards as now, but more boards will generate proportionally higher awards. 24 boards will be $133 \%$ of 18 boards, 27 boards 50\% more, and less that 18 boards will decrease proportionally.

In addition, effective July 1, VACB awards will be capped at 2.5 masterpoints for regular club games versus 4.0 currently.

In an effort to encourage tournament attendance, all tournaments will have a $20 \%$ bonus in masterpoint awards for a year. In addition, F2F regionals may begin play any time on the first day of the tournament.

Districts may run another Royal STaC during the last 4 months of the year. These events gave a boost to F2F play.

Management has been authorized to conduct 2 regionally rated online events during the rest
 of 2022. These may be September 15-18 and December 20-23 as no other regionals are running those days.

The visitor policy of $15 \%$ was eliminated for clubs running less than 50 tables/week of VACB play.

Trends since our Reno meeting have continued to be concerning. Membership continues to fall and tournament tables are disappointing although more tournaments are being held. Management has been developing a plan for attracting new members and we'll discuss that in Providence.

I hope to have seen many of you at the regional tournaments in Topeka and Austin at the end of June.

The District held its GNT Finals over Memorial Day weekend, online on BBO, led by the expert directing from Kevin Perkins. There were three teams competing in the Championship Flight, four in Flight A, nine in Flight B and six in Flight C.
The competition began in the Championship Flight and Flight B on Saturday and in A and C on Sunday. On Saturday the Hessel team (Ira Hessel, Phil Clayton, Bart Bramley and Dan Morse) qualified for the finals, as did the Yang team (Hua Yang, Han Song, Danny Feng and Steve Chen). So, the Sunday Finals would pit last year's District 16 Championship Flight winner against last year's Flight A winner in both D16 and the Nationals.

In B, four teams qualified for the Sunday finals, led by the Chen team (Sarah Chen, Hanchang Wang, Charlie Chen and Andrew Chen), a family effort including 11-year old Andrew. Other qualifiers were Chu (Jin Chu, Pingshan Wen, Bob Bender and Robert Holliday), Ramsey (Ross Ramsey, Stu Nelan, Sharon Harbach and Arvind Sharma) and Justman (Lilly Justman, Kalyan Venkat, Barbara Morgan, Kathryn Bailey, Stuart Litwin, and Jarek Langer).

On Sunday, Flights A and C got started and qualified their finalist for Monday, while the Championship Flight (recapped below) and B crowned their winner and runner-up, both of whom are eligible to compete in the Nationals in Providence in July. The Chu team won handily, repeating from 2021, while Chen finished second.

In Flight A the Dater team (Jeff Dater, Kim Brinkman, Eric Diamond and Bob Friz) and the

Hanus team (Pawel Hanus, Ari Sippola, James Zhan and Ying Peng) moved forward to the finals on Monday. In a close match that went back and forth, the Hanus team turned in a big third quarter to win Flight A.

In Flight C, the teams of Shepherd (William Shepherd, Brian Dudley, Nathan Yee, and Scott Cantor), Javor (Kenneth and Constance Javor, James Summers, and Laura Pantano), Weber (Sara Weber, Dena Hill, Donna Burnett, and Demaris Hart) and Hardcastle (Janice Hardcastle, Susan Banks-Johnson, Kathy L’Hommedieu, and Martin Hrachovy) qualified for the semi-finals, with Shepherd and Javor earning spots in the Finals on Monday afternoon. Shepherd won to take home the Flight C title.

The Championship Flight finals got off to the kind of start you would expect with these two teams. On board 1, both teams pushed to a poor 4S game and went down 1. Then Yang's team got too high, going for -1100 against the nonvulnerable game. Another aggressive game that failed for Yang, left them trailing by 20 early on. On board 5, a vulnerable game swung on how to play A9xxx opposite KTxx. Bramley led small from the KT hand, fetching the CQ. So, the odds wizard applied the rule of restricted choice and finessed on the way back ... losing to QJ tight. Yang played the K from his hand, again fetching a club honor and couldn't go wrong. 10 IMPs to Yang. And Yang caught up when Hessel played a vulnerable 1NT at both tables and went down two both times. Board 9 presented an interesting twist of fate when both sides opened 1 NT , transferred to spades and after a super-accept stopped in 3S. But Yang had retransferred and played it from the big hand, while Hessel's Dan Morse played it from the opposite side. It turned out that the defense was easier with the big hand
declaring - a heart lead led to a heart ruff - and Yang's Danny Feng was quickly down 1. From the other side, a heart lead from Axxx didn't look so attractive, so Yang led the CA, extracting his only side entry prematurely. But in a very nice recovery, he switched to a low heart, and his partner was able to win the first spade trick, put her partner in with a heart and score her ruff to push the board. After some small swings, Hessel led 28-26 at the end of the first quarter.

On the first board of the second set, Yang made three slam tries before stopping short of an unmakeable slam. Hessel bid it, and it came home when a singleton to dummy's K was ducked. 10 IMPs to Hessel. Then Hessel found the killing lead against a vulnerable 3NT - a spade, which dummy had bid at the other table, but not here - for 11 more. Yang got too high on a part-score hand and went for -500; 10 more for Hessel and the lead was up to 33. But Hessel failed to find their five tricks off the top against 3NT, while 5C was failing at the other table; 12 IMPs to Yang. And, once again, the comeback was complete when both sides bid a thin 3NT. Bramley played it from behind the heart overcall and had no chance on a heart lead. Played from the other side, a heart lead was not successful although a diamond lead would have worked - and Yan Song brought home the game to virtually even the match at the half. Hessel led 58-57.

It took no time for Yang to take the lead, when Hessel's lead found the Q for declarer, while Phil Clayton took the two-way finesse the wrong way. Then they gave it back when they played an unmakeable 3NT instead of a merely marginal 5C, which came home on a defensive slip. Yang regained the lead when both teams bid a distributional 4S, after the opponents opened 1NT and his partner held a 7-count. Yang doubled, led a spade and beat it one trick. Hessel led a club from AKQxx, imagine that, and the contract came home. 13 IMPs to Yang. Hessel closed the gap to two IMPs on the last board of the set, when Phil Clayton opened QJxx x QTxxxx xx 3D at favorable vulnerability, catching his LHO with a balanced 26-count. Yang settled into 3NT, making 5, while Hessel and Morse found a making 6H, after a more-normal 2C opening. Yang
ended the set with a 2-IMP lead, with 12 boards to play. 85-83.

On the second board, Yang bid a pushy 3NT. It looks like it is doomed to fail, but Steve Chen had a chance. But when Clayton played a small spade from AKx at trick nine, Chen played low from Qxx and went down two, instead of making. That was a 19-IMP difference and Hessel was back in front. It stayed that way until the penultimate board, number 47, when Hessel bid a slam that was on a finesse and Yang stopped in 5. The 48 -board match was about to come down to a 50/50 contract. The finesse was wrong and that was 11 IMPs to Yang, who moved back into the lead by 6 with one board to play. A flat last board meant that Yang won and is headed to Providence to represent the District.

It was a great match, played by two great teams.

In the last issue, you were given the following hand and asked to formulate a line of play to take 11 tricks.
Stop for a moment to recall your plan, or to draw a plan up if you'd not seen the prior article.

HAND 2:
your chances way back (or give yourself no chance). So write down your plan and check that it works.

You'll need to specify the spots you play for full credit - it's not enough to call 'low' or 'high' of this suit or that one.

This one needs a bit of luck - but it's the only reasonable line I could think of at the table, and it's a reasonable shot.

## What's our plan?

Let's consider what we have: six diamond tricks, a spade, and we can force a heart trick by setting up the king or queen - but that's only eight tricks. We also have two aces to lose, so we can't afford to lose any other tricks. We might hope for King of Spades to be onside and trump to split 2-1, in which case we would come to 11 tricks by six diamonds in dummy, two ruffs in hand, two spades, and a heart --- but South's 2 club overcall makes it likely that he's got the spade king... isn't there a better way to come to 11 tricks?

Note that ruffing a club in dummy doesn't get us an extra trick, it’s just one of the six diamond tricks we've already counted.

This is a hand from the Spring National held in Reno, Nevada, March 2022.

Once again, nothing particularly tricky, and no particularly wild distribution to contend with. You need to find a distribution that allows you to take 11 tricks in diamonds after the ace of clubs is led, and South shifts to a diamond.
You were given the following hints:
Diamonds are 2-1
You'll need to specify the timing. Do things in the wrong order, or at the wrong time, and you cut

The best chance is to find a favorable lie of the heart suit, and only fall back on the spade finesse if hearts "don't work".

The play should go like this:
Trick 1: Ace of clubs, all following
Trick 2: Diamond from South, play Q from the board and K from our hand (keeping entries!)
Trick 3: Ruff a club high (not for fear of an overruff, but to keep entries!)
Trick 4: 8 or 6 of trump to our King (note that the trump suit can still provide two entries to
our hand or two entries to dummy, whichever we may need)
Trick 5: Lead a low heart toward the queen.
South is in a bit of a pickle; if he wins the ace he's helping us set up our heart suit for spade pitches; if he leads a spade makes sure we get two spade tricks, and if he leads a club, it's a ruff-and-sluff, so we pitch our low spade (4) from our hand (later pitching one of dummy's spades on the heart king and ruffing the other two in hand). On the other hand, if LHO plays low, we win the queen in dummy and lead a heart back toward our KT.
Trick 6: In fact, LHO did duck, and the heart queen won. When we lead the heart 3 , we see RHO play the 9. It's looking like hearts are $3-3$, isn't it? But even if LHO started with Ax, he's going to be stuck really soon. We play the ten on RHO's nine of hearts, and LHO wins the Ace. What's he to do?
a contract that not many people will be in? Find a way to make it! Your reward will be scoring close to a top, instead of getting close to a zero on that board. In a 26 -board game, changing one board from a bottom to a top means that your score for that session goes up by almost 4\%. Maybe your next $57 \%$ game can become a $61 \%$ game if you take the time to figure out one "impossible" hand.

The only downside? You'll get a reputation, and partners will start putting you in "impossible" contracts more often!



Here's a hand from recent club play you can think about for next issue:

Yes, the auction is pretty bad, but that's close to how it happened at the table. In any case, you're in Four Spades with the club four lead.

You can see that you have two aces to lose.

From Ax original holding, he's in a pickle. No
Maybe. Is there a way to swindle 12 tricks? red cards, so he has to lead a spade to give us the spade suit on a free finesse, or a club to give us a ruff-andsluff. (At the table, South chose to lead a spade away from his King, just in case his partner had the ace)

From Axx, he can lead another heart, but hearts are now 3-3 in defender's hands, and we have three good hearts to pitch dummy's J T 2 of spades... now we play the spade A and ruff the spade 4 for six diamonds, four hearts, and a spade, 5 Diamonds making.

Yes, this hand isn't bulletproof as I've outlined above. LHO might have started with AJx of hearts. Or RHO might have had the ace. But I think this is a pretty good line that gives you great chances of making 11 tricks when LHO has either Ax or Axx of hearts.

Boards like this are really important when you want to do well at any level of bridge. You're in

## Bridge Center of Austin

As we all know, Bridge is the most beautiful game in the world. It is a sport that we like to call "a game" since it is so much fun.

Like any other sport, in bridge we need an authority that can help us out to determine what needs to be done when there are irregularities or disagreements at the table. We call them directors and every sanctioned game has to have one.

Having said that, rulings are not the only reason that bridge directors exist. Unlike many sports, bridge can be scored in many different ways and have different movements. A good bridge director is one that can choose a movement and direct in a way that the duplicate runs smoothly, on time and with the least problems, animosity and interruptions as possible.
Yes, it is more complicated that it seems. Being a good director requires great knowledge about duplicate laws and passing a test to prove it, but also having the skill to maintain discipline and adjust disputes.

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## The most important ones are:

- Help decide and choose the best scoring method and movement based on the number of players and other matters
- Ensure the game is played under equitable conditions for all players
- To guarantee that the game is played on time
- Dealing with matters that damage the game such as: late plays, rudeness, Inappropriate actions, foul language. Remember that the ACBL has a ZERO TOLERANCE policy on this
- To administer and interpret the laws. And he must bring the rule's book EVERY TIME he makes a ruling
- Advising the players of their rights and responsibilities when revokes, bids out of turn, leads out of turn and other irregularities happen
- To adjust disputes such as failures to alert or announce, hesitations, breaks in tempo, etcetera
- Dealing with any matters delegated to him by the tournament organizer. Yes. The tournament organizer is the director's boss and not the other way around
- To refer any matter to an appropriate committee, especially when he considers unethical behavior has taken place

For reasons I sometimes understand and I sometimes do not, there is some tension between players and directors. They vary in shape and form but as players, we must avoid contributing to this tension first by understanding that the director is a FRIEND OF THE TABLE. Yes, FRIEND.

A director is there to make sure justice is served AND we don't have to argue with opponents. Specially if sometimes these opponents are our friends and we don't want to create any sour feelings. Even more, they can be our soon-to-be friends or love interests, or bridge partners. So is better to have someone that does the difficult calls. Is like having a therapist that you can blame everything on!

So next time you see a director, say hi, learn his name, say thank you and don't hesitate to call him. Also, don't get offended if someone else does. Remember, he is everyone's friend $\boldsymbol{\downarrow}$
