An officer, and a gentleman, and the king of 3 No Trump. Bill was the reason that I came back to playing bridge after retiring for about fifteen years. I was persuaded to play as a fourth in a team match with this special gentleman and after that I could never refuse him. I am guessing that without Bill, there would never have been a Fiesta Bridge Club. With his support and encouragement, I opened Fiesta Bridge Club in 2013 at our new location in Castle Hills, when we were forced to move out of Turtle Creek BC premises. A positive influence at the bridge table, he had a great smile and an even better sense of humor. One thing that really got to me was that it seemed to take him forever to make a bid. On one particular hand, I opened 1 diamond with 18 points intending to rebid 2NT. Bill took so long to bid 2 NT that I forgot that I had opened and thought that he had opened 2NT. Of course, I bid 7NT! When the dummy came down, he didn't even flinch and actually managed to make 6 NT.

James Cuccia, our sharp dresser with a gentle smile, lives with his poodle, Tony and plays bridge every day, but that's not the beginning of his story. In fact, James, over 90 years young, spent 22 years in the U.S. Navy, 41 years as a researcher and 46 years in education committing his almost century-long life in service to others.

In the Navy, James served during the Korean War as a Communications, Radar, Submarine Battery and Generator Technician. He was active duty for 2 years and 8 months before spending another 20 years in the reserves.

While serving, he also worked at Southwest Research Institute where James' key project centered on helping the Pentagon by measuring the quantity of water in the U.S. Army gunpowder barrels. The foundation of his research and the insights yielded from that pursuit had greater value than the initial project – in fact, his breakthrough results were scalable and led to the development to MRI medical equipment that benefit millions of people annually.

James enjoyed his research so much that he decided to serve as an adjunct professor at St Philip's College to inspire curiosity in over 5,000 students. By partnering with an industrial researcher, James and his students helped develop a sorting machine to separate grains of rice for the iconic company, Uncle Ben's. Originally, rice was separated by hand, resulting in many labor hours and a greater margin for error. Together, under James' direction, his team created the economic and efficient technology still used today.

In his spare time, James enjoyed spending time with his wife (until her passing), playing five different instruments in many bands over 18 years, and playing bridge – in fact, he's played almost every day for the last eight years – and his partners (most call him THEIR "boy friend") find him to be a great player and an amazing human.

Bertie BroerMorning Side Pairs (Tuesday)

FOR MY FATHER, MY MENTOR, MY GUARDIAN ANGEL

Bertie Broer was born in South Africa in 1923. After volunteering to serve with the Allies in World War II, he returned to Johannesburg where he studied to become a Chartered Accountant and Auditor (CPA) and worked in the family practice which his father and late uncle had started many years prior.

I do not know exactly when Bertie started playing bridge, but I recall very vividly when I was still in elementary school that every Monday night, two medical students that Bertie was mentoring would come for dinner prior to the weekly Monday night duplicate game, resulting in me knowing all the bridge terminology at a very young age. Monday night tournaments were like a league with Sections A to L and then four color sections, more than 300 players. Each section of the approximately 16 sections would have 12 pairs (6 tables) and they would play a Howell movement. Each pair would be allocated points based on where they finished and ultimately players who did well in their section would move to the next higher section and the players who didn't do so well would move to a lower section... and the following week they would be back! Bertie was always in the A section. On other Monday nights, there would be Team of Four matches, which would consist of a whole match against another team consisting of about 28 boards. The victory points for each match would be recorded and carried forward for the next week. At the end of cycle, there would be a winner and a runner up in each section.

Friday and Saturday afternoons were reserved for the Rubber Bridge Club. Bertie said they he really learned to play bridge by playing for more money than he could afford! He also claimed that a huge part of his success at the bridge table was reading every bridge book that he could lay his hands on. I learned to play bridge after marrying a bridge player! Even though I was a complete novice, Bertie would give me a hand and ask me how I would bid it. He was never condescending and taught me so many different aspects of the game. I loved to watch him play no-trump contracts. He would switch from suit to suit and often had his opponents (and me) completely baffled. However, he would often make that extra trick or two!

Bertie represented South Africa in the World Olympiad in Deauville, France in 1968; Miami Beach, USA in 1972; Valkenburg, Netherlands in 1976; and the Bermuda Bowl in Tunisia in 1997. He also represented South Africa in a number of Maccabi Games in Israel.

Bertie loved life and everyone loved Bertie for his wisdom, friendliness and infectious laugh. He told me never to wish away the time. He said that the best place to be was where he was at that particular time. Bertie always said when it was his time he wanted to "die at the bridge table in 4 Diamonds doubled, redoubled and making!" However, that was not to be and he passed away from heart complications in 2002. [Laurie Levin]



Diane OlsonOpen Pairs (Thursday)

There are few San Antonio players whose lives have not been touched by Diane and whose bridge games have not been improved by her teaching. Diane was a Platinum Life Master, holding 10,000 master points when she passed away in May 2022. She was quick to remind us that she had been playing for many years, as if that explained it! Diane taught bridge to many, many students and ran the Tuesday afternoon 299er game for many years. She always made time to mentor novice players and play with intermediate players. Although she was among the superstars in the San Antonio bridge community, Diane was always patient and polite with those at the table. She was highly and affectionately regarded by all. Sue OhmMorning Side Pairs (Thursday)

Sue was a keen duplicate player and director for Fiesta Bridge Club. She started and subsequently ran the Tuesday evening and Sunday afternoon games for several years. When Covid-19 hit, Sue stepped up to direct most of the Fiesta virtual games and continued directing them until her death in January 2022. Without Sue, the club might well not have survived the long Covid-19 shutdown. Despite many health problems, Sue was always very positive, kind, and generous of spirit. She was a huge part of the local bridge community.



Bill WalkerBracketed Swiss (Saturday)

Bill Walker was an Emerald Life Master when he passed away in 2021. He was not only a strong bridge player, he was a gentleman and a gentle man who was highly respected by the bridge community for those attributes. The Unit recognized his stature by naming a Sectional Tournament in his honor.

Bill was also highly respected outside the bridge world. For many years he was in charge of the competitive swim program for the North East School District. Over the years the District produced many state champions and many swimmers who were winners at the national and Olympic levels. Upon Bill's retirement, the District named its swimming facility after Bill.

In contrast, Bill's early adult life was not so rosy. He became an alcoholic and experienced at least one life-threatening event. But he recognized the need for change, went to AA, and was an abstainer for the rest of his life. His recognition of how life-threatening addiction could be led him to engage in a "prison ministry" for several decades. He would conduct sessions with prisoners to convince them that addiction to alcohol or drugs can ruin their lives but that they had the capacity to overcome such addiction. While many either didn't get the message or didn't have the strength to change their lives, some did. These victories are the ultimate testimonial to Bill.



John Hilbig Open Pairs (Friday)

John Hilbig was the oldest of six boys and was born in San Antonio. He graduated from Wisconsin University majoring in journalism. His career started in Big Spring, TX as a journalist. There he met and married Lynna, and then off to Viet Nam in the army for two years. Next John went to Dallas to work and there obtained his masters in journalism at North Texas University.

Playing bridge in John's life started in high school and he was self-taught. He ended back in San Antonio 1984 to work for Valero in the accounting department. From 1984-2011 playing bridge was not a part of John's life.

John is being honored today for his tireless work as the Chairman of the 2023 4th of July Regional. He also served on the Unit 172 Board of Directors and has also been a Mentor to novice players. Jim's mom was an elementary school teacher and his name sake was a roustabout, roughneck in the Wichita Falls area in the 1920's. Tena's dad was a traveling salesman from Oklahoma City. He had a chance to sink his life savings into a floundering coffee company. He kept the company name "Cain's". Jim and Tena met at Oklahoma University. Tena had been attending one of the 7 sister schools, but her dad sent her a wire at the end of her sophomore year - "I'm not allowing you to stay up there and marry one of the GD YANKEES. Enrolled in OU, she met Jim, set her sights on him with only one likely outcome. They were married, Jim entered the Air Force and was stationed in Korea after which they moved to San Antonio. He worked in the oil business, became a stockbroker, and tried his hand at banking over the years. They were married for 68 years and passed away within 10 months of each other at 90 years of age. Jim and Tena played party bridge at home and at the San Antonio Country Club. In their 70's and in good health (even with Jim's triple bypass) they decided to try duplicate bridge. Jim's favorite bridge tale: "the players at the bridge club are the NICEST people, but they SURE WANT TO KICK YOUR BUTT." I met Jim in 1973 right after he had been chosen King Antonio. Tena was on several boards, a driving force in philanthropy and a GREAT FRIEND Still, 2 years after losing them, I find myself going down 281 and saying: "I really need to stop at 200 Patterson and check in on them."
