The Bidding:

North has a balancing decision after East's 2♥ overcall of their 1♠ opening is passed around. North has a fine offensive hand with two five-card suits and a void. North's hand, with four quick tricks, will play well on defense. What decision did North make at your table?

A rebid of 3♣ does little to consult partner on the best contract. A balancing double offers diamonds and clubs as potential contracts, as well as giving partner a chance to make a belated spade raise. If partner has a heart stack and chooses to convert the balancing double to penalty, partner will not be disappointed with North's contributions to the defense. A balancing double seems best.

South hardly has a trump stack. The texture of South's 5-card heart suit leaves a lot to be desired. However, South does not have attractive alternatives. Bidding a minor at the 3-level could wind up playing in a 3-3 fit. Some pairs play a convention in this situation to help find the best minor suit fit. Even so, with 3-card support for both minors, competing to the 3-level in a minor is risky. Competing to 2♠ is a possibility. The spade fit is at least 5-2. South has two helpful diamond cards. There should be a reasonable chance to make 2♠. Converting the double for penalty is a possibility as well. Mel's suggests not converting the double. On this board, I would be swayed by the diamond honors and expect to force declarer in either hearts or diamonds. While a 2♠ bid is completely reasonable, my preference would be to convert the double for penalty.

The Lead:


On lead against 2♥ doubled, South has three good options. A trump lead will reduce dummy's ruffing power, potentially leaving declarer with more diamond and/or spade losers. A spade lead may help establish partner's spades and force declarer to ruff in the long hand, helping South gain trump control. A diamond lead may also serve to force declarer and helps establish the diamond suit. Partner should have 3 or more diamonds for their balancing double. My preference would be lead the ♦King, top of a sequence, or ♦Queen if playing leads.

The Play:

The defense has several routes to a two-trick set of 2♥ doubled. The defense has 5 quick tricks in spades and diamonds, and will eventually score the ♥King. A 7th trick can be established for the defense by preventing declarer from ruffing two spades in dummy,

or by positioning South to ruff a club. On a spade lead and continuation, South can discard clubs and later put partner in for a club ruff. If a diamond is led, a spade switch and continuation can allow South to discard clubs and later ruff a club.

If South leads a trump or switches to a trump after a diamond lead, declarer will have quite a dilemma. Declarer can picture the likely spade doubleton in South's hand. Declarer would like to win the initial heart lead cheaply with the ♥8 (or 9) in dummy and get rid of the ♥2 from hand. The danger is that when attempting to ruff two spades in dummy, South will ruff in front of dummy forcing the remaining high spot card, leaving only the ♥3 in dummy. Declarer would be unable to safely obtain their second spade ruff. So the play of the ♥3 is forced. Declarer will need to play spades to shorten dummy for the ruffs. North can put South in with a diamond to continue shortening dummy. South must take care not to get end played in hearts.

The Lead:

West does not have an attractive lead against 3NT. West knows dummy does not have spade support and does not have a 5-card red suit. So dummy will have game forcing values and will either have a club suit or a balanced hand. Declarer should not have a 4-card red suit on this auction and should not have a 6-card spade suit. West would like to hit partner's suit with their opening lead, but must guess whether partner's suit is hearts, or diamonds, or, a less likely, clubs.

My preference would be to lead a diamond because I can help establish the diamond suit. The downside of the diamond lead is that it can easily blow a trick for the defense.

The Play:

Declarer has 5 quick tricks in a notrump contract.. A fourth club trick can be developed on a 3-3, the Jack dropping, or a finesse. A low club to the Queen will likely get a true count from the defenders. The heart texture is not strong enough to develop tricks with a pushing finesse against the King. It is better to take a lobbing finesse towards the ♥Queen-Jack. The lobbing finesse creates two additional heart tricks when the ♥King is in East's hand. If hearts break 4-2, declarer will need two entries to dummy for the lobbing finesses, and another entry to dummy to cash the long club, and the ♥Ace.

On the lead of the ♦8, declarer has a choice. If the 8 is a 4th best lead, declarer can win three diamond tricks by finessing against the Jack and King. If the lead is from Jack third, declarer has only one diamond entry. If the lead is from King third, declarer has two diamond entries to dummy. Finessing against the King and Jack seems right. It gives a chances for three diamond tricks and acts as a play in diamonds.

If the play begins with a diamond to the Jack, a diamond continuation, and a lobbing finesse in hearts, declarer can give East a difficult discard decision. East cannot discard a heart or a diamond with out giving up a trick. So East must unguard the ♠Queen-Jack.

With the hearts and clubs breaking 3-3, declarers will have no trouble taking nine tricks. With the fortuitous lie of the spades, a double dummy line of play would be to attack spades for an overtrick.

The Bidding:

With two five-card majors and 11 HCP, South's hand meets the for an opener. Over 1♠, West has the values and shape to make a takeout double. Over a Take Out Double, many partnerships play a 2NT as an invitational or better raise. This leave 3♠ free to use as a weak raise. With that understanding, North can make a bid of 3♠, showing 4-card or better support and a weak hand.

North's preemptive raise to 3♠ puts a lot of pressure on East. After a jump bid by your RHO, the mandates a 10 second pause to avoid communicating unauthorized information to partner with a quick action, and to give you and your LHO time to contemplate their action.

East should use the 10-second waiting period to assess the risks and rewards of competing over 3♠. West will have at least three diamonds for their takeout double, or West will have a hand too strong to overcall 2♣ or 2♥. With 10 HCP and a 6-card diamond suit, 4♦ will have some play. If partner's hand was too strong to overcall, a heart game or a club game are likely. If 3♠ makes, few matchpoints will be available to East-West. It is not clear that 3♠ down 1, doubled or not, will be a good board for East-West. Bidding 4♦ has a couple of ways to win: 4♦ may make, or 4♦ down 1 may be a good sacrifice against 3♠. 4♦ loses when it is doubled and set, when it down 2 for -200, and when both 4♦ and 3♠ are going down. Another way for 4♦ to win or lose is when partner raised to 5♦. Making 5♦ should be worth a lot of matchpoints. Down 1 is unlikely to score well.

Forcing opponents to make difficult decisions like this one is why playing a jump to 3 of a major over a takeout double as a preemptive raise is so popular. My guess with East's hand would be that more matchpoints are available by competing than by passing; and I would bid 4♦ when the 10 second waiting period expired.


West may be tempted to bid 5♦. The small doubleton spade holding is a big negative. West only has a of 7, and has a 3-card diamond suit. The 15 Support Points do not make up for the hand's negatives. A pass seems prudent.

The Play:

To prevent declarer from making an overtrick in a 4♦ contract, the defense must take their spade tricks immediately. If South cashes the ♠Ace and King and switches to their singleton club, declarer may well do down. Declarer has a potential loser in clubs and a potential loser in diamonds. With a nine-card trump fit, playing for the Queen to drop has a 58% chance of success. The club finesse has a 50% chance of success. Declarer would like to combine their chances make the contract when either the ♣King is onside or the ♦Queen drops. Taking the club finesse at tricks 3 costs only when South has a singleton club and North has the King. So taking the finesses is the percentage play.

On this board, the club finesse loses and North can set 4♦ by giving partner a ruff. The ♣2 cannot be from a doubleton. So declare has either a singleton club or a 3-card club suit. If declarer had a singleton, they would not be likely to duck the club lead. So North should continue clubs, giving partner a ruff, even if declarer false cards by dropping the Queen.

The Bidding:

At most tables, the bidding will pass around to South in 4th seat. South has a full opening 1♠ bid. North will respond 1NT. With a semi-balanced hand with the majority of the hand's strength in the red doubletons, some may choose to pass 1NT. A pass is a reasonable matchpoint gamble. Partner is a passed hand and could not support spades. There is no compelling reason to believe a club contract will score better than 1NT. The biggest risk of passing 1NT is that partner has a good red suit and is planning to offer 2♦ or 2♥ as a final contract. Your strong doubletons would provide good support. Since partner did not open a , it is less likely that playing in a red suit will score better than 1NT.

At most tables, North will choose to bid rebid 2♣, showing 5+ spades and 4+ clubs. Now North will have to decide between passing 2♣, potentially a 4-3 fit, or giving a preference to 2♠, a 5-2 fit (or better). With King doubleton support, a preference to 2♠ is very reasonable.

The Lead:

West has a difficult lead against 2♠. Holding trump length, a forcing lead is often best, but a lead from Jack empty fourth could easily blow a trick, and does not do much to wrest trump control from declarer. Leading away from the ♦Ace is unattractive. A trump lead could blow a trick, and a club lead may well finesse partner.

The Play:

In 2♠, Declarer has 4 quick tricks. If trumps split 3-3, declarer will have just one trump loser. With a 4-2 break, two trump losers are likely. Declarer's heart loser may be avoided if the defense breaks the heart suit. Declarer has one diamond loser. After knocking out the ♦Ace, three diamond winners are established. Declarer should note the blockage in the diamond suit, and manage entries accordingly. There are two potential losers in the club suit.

Declarer would prefer that East break the club suit.. Declarer will knock out the **♦**Ace, and pitch losers on dummy's diamonds.

1. Game forcing

The Bidding:

With 23 HCP and a nice 5-card heart suit, North will open a strong, artificial and forcing 2♣. Over partner's anticipated 2♦ waiting bid, North has a choice between rebidding 2NT showing a strong balanced hand, or 2♥ showing a strong hand with five or more hearts. My preference would be to bid 2NT. In addition to 2NT well describing North's hand, it protects North's ♠King in a notrump contract.

On this board with favorable vulnerability, East will not allow North-South much bidding space to explore the best game or slam. East will preempt in diamonds. Given the broken suit, a 3♦ preempt looks about right.

South's 10 HCP hand with a 7-card club suit passes the for an opening hand. Opposite a 2♣ opener, slam potential is high. Has your partnership discussed how to handle interference after a ? Many play a double shows a weak hand, and a pass or bid establishes a . Using that treatment, I prefer a pass. An immediate 3♣ bid may make it difficult for partner to describe their hand. In particular, South is interested in knowing whether partner has a diamond stopper.

When 3♦ is passed around to North, North has the same options they contemplated earlier except one-level higher. North-South can destroy 3♦, but it is common to play a double by the 2♣ opener as takeout oriented. At this vulnerability, a 3NT rebid seems like the percentage action.

Continuations from here should be the same as the partnership uses after they overcall 3NT after a 3-level preempt. Most play 4♣ is Stayman, 4♦ and 4♥ are transfers, and 5♣ is . This leaves 4♠ to show clubs or some minor suit slam try. If you partnership has not discussed continuations on this auction, it is best to bid slam directly. South knows the partnership has 32+ HCP. With two bullets and a 7-card suit, a jump to 6♣ or 6NT is reasonable. However, if partner has the missing club honors you may well have all the tricks.

Partnerships playing Gerber can check for Aces, and check for Kings upon learning they have all the Aces. Missing a King, the bidding might settle in 6NT. Partnerships playing 4♠ as a relay, might use the relay and then bid 6♣ to express interest in a grand. With the ♠King-Queen, North can cue bid 6♦, showing first round

diamond control. Now when South shows their spade control, North may try 7NT. Bidding 6NT should score plenty of matchpoints.

The Play:

It will take declarer a few moments to count up their winners. If playing in a notrump contract, declarer can claim immediately. Playing a suit contract, declarer will have to wait to make sure third hand does not ruff the opening lead before claiming all the tricks.
